Cynthia Enloe has been named Clark University's Outstanding Teacher of the Year three times and also has been recognized as the University Senior Faculty Fellow for Excellence in Teaching and Scholarship. Her feminist teaching and research has focused on the interplay of women's politics in the national and international arenas, with special attention to how women's labor is made cheap in globalized factories (especially sneaker factories) and how women's emotional and physical labor has been used to support governments' war-waging policies—and how many women have tried to resist both of those efforts.

In recent years, Enloe has been invited to lecture and give special seminars on feminism, militarization, and globalization in the U.S. as well as overseas. She has written for *Ms. Magazine* and *Village Voice* and has appeared on National Public Radio and the BBC. She serves on the editorial boards of several scholarly journals and has written nine books, including her newest, *Globalization and Militarism: Feminists Make the Link* (2007).
