The course is open to students in any program at any Webster campus, students from other Universities, alumni, and others interested in international relations or global studies.

Description of Courses

JOUR 3150 – British Media: Print

“British Media: Print” is set in London, arguably the news media capital of the world with its many daily newspapers and its location as a hub for many of the world’s great news wire services. The course will focus on the thriving newspaper industry that has so influenced the journalism practiced in the rest of the world. From the outrageous tabloids to the stately, full-format gray ladies, the course will examine the history, style and content of Britain’s national newspaper located in London. The course also will provide a cursory look at attendant media: television, advertising and wire services. Journalism education in the isles also will be taken up as part of the course.

In addition to pre-course and post-course activities coordinated under a separate handout, the course core will consist of two weeks in London with a schedule of visits to various media sites and a selection of lectures/interviews with various representatives of the British media. There also will be several meetings of the class at the Regent’s College campus of Webster University.

Course Costs

The cost of the course is the Fall 2007 tuition for 3 credit hours plus a lab fee of \$1,500 and a study abroad fee of \$150. The lab fee includes housing at Regent’s College in the center of London, half-board equivalent at Regent’s, and visits and tour expenses in England. The study abroad fee covers the Lonely Planet guidebook to London, the International Student Identity Card (ISIC), and international health insurance. Students are responsible for transportation to/from London, England, some meals, textbooks, passport, and other personal expenses.

Tuition: Fall 2007 tuition (\$495/credit hour)

Program Deposit: \$150 Study Abroad Fee*

Lab fee: \$1,500

Airfare - Varies by originating city (responsibility of students)

*If the student is not accepted for the class or the University cancels the class on or before the application deadline, the deposit fee will be refunded in full. If the student drops or withdraws from the course after the application deadline, the deposit is not refunded.

Application Deadline: June 29, 2007

How to Apply

Download and complete [Application and Student Treatment and Release Form](#) (pdf - 69.2 KB) and [Medical Information Form](#) (pdf - 66.7 KB).

Send to the Office of Study Abroad with deposit (study abroad fee) of \$150 (in US funds) payable to Webster University. (Address, email and fax below). The fee and Application Form must be received by the Office of Study Abroad on or before June 29, 2007. Note that the study abroad fee deposit is not refundable after June 29, 2007, unless Webster University rejects the Application.

Course Registration

Register for the courses. Webster University students may self-enroll in the class or enroll through an Academic Advisor.

Non-Webster University students may enroll as a non-degree seeking student through an advisor in the Undergraduate Academic Advising Office.

Go or No-Go Date

Webster University will confirm that the course has sufficient enrollments by June 29, 2007. Please book and purchase your airline ticket to London after Webster University has confirmed the course is a "Go." Plan to arrive in London on August 4 or 5, 2007.

Verify that your passport will be valid for the travel dates.
